College-Goal Sunday provides FAFSA help

WHS students planning on attending college have a great opportunity available to them this Sunday as Sioux Falls hosts College Goal Sunday.

The aim of this program is to provide a free workshop to help students complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students and parents will receive help for the on-line form and also get financial aid information.

Gov. Mike Rounds signed a proclamation naming Sunday "College Goal Sunday." As part of the event, \$9,500 worth of scholarships will be awarded to some of those who attend. The event will run from 2-4 p.m. at Southeast Technical Institute and students and parents can come anytime during that time span to receive free help.

Counselor Kurt Turbak hopes parents and students take advantage of this free

opportunity.

"Sunday will be a very helpful event when people can get all their financial aid and FAFSA questions answered for free," Turbak said.

Items that are requested to be taken to the event include completed 2007 IRS tax returns, W-2 statements, 2007 income and assets information, 2007 untaxed income records, FAFSA PIN, driver's license, and social security numbers.

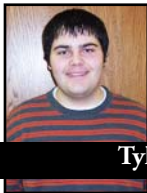

McCain takes lead; Democrats trade wins

WASHINGTON—New York Sen. Hillary Clinton won a string of key battleground states across the country Tuesday with a coalition of women, older voters and moderates, but Illinois Sen. Barack Obama kept pace with his own series of victories.

The results mean that the Clinton-Obama duel will continue for weeks and possibly months. Both campaigns stressed Tuesday night that they were ready to battle later this week in Louisiana and Nebraska, which hold contests Saturday; in Maryland, Virginia



and the District of Columbia next Tuesday; and possibly all the way to the August Democratic convention.

In the race for the Republican nomination, Arizona Sen. John McCain swept to victories in the Northeast, the industrial Midwest and the Southwest, amassing delegates in what he hoped would be a Super Tuesday march toward the Republican presidential nomination.

McCain took New York, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Illinois and his home state of Arizona, seizing all their delegates in winner-take-all contests. He also won Oklahoma, which has a more complex system of awarding delegates.

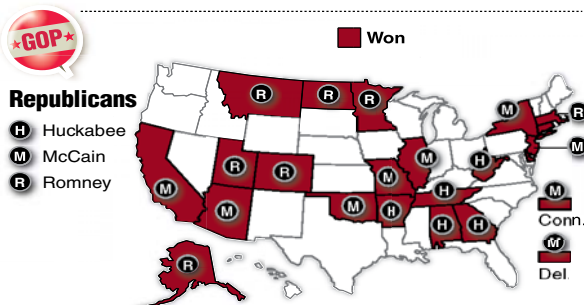
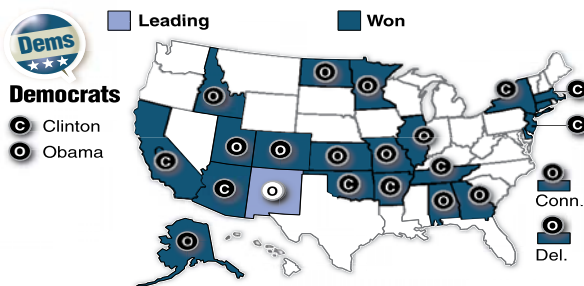
