Warriors take on O’G in big Dakota Bowl game

No. 2 rated Warriors try to remain undefeated

The No. 2 ranked varsity football team will kick-off their second game of the season and the first game in Sioux Falls this Saturday in the 30th annual Dakota Bowl at Howard Wood Field at 8 p.m.

Starting in 1978, the Dakota Bowl has been a huge fund-raiser for the Sioux Falls Catholic schools, raising an estimated \$2.5 million dollars over the 30 years. The highly anticipated match up will include the Warriors facing cross town rival, the O’Gorman Knights.

Sophomore safety Matt Hermanson said he is excited for the upcoming game against O’Gorman.

“The Dakota Bowl is always fun to play in, especially against a cross-town rival like O’Gorman,” Hermanson said. “The team is ready to play hard Saturday and come out with a win.”

Last weekend WHS defeated the Sturgis Scoopers 37-0 and are hoping to keep that momentum going this week in another Greater Dakota Conference match-up against the previ-

ously No. 2 ranked Knights. O’Gorman fell from the ratings this week after a 24-21 loss to Brandon Valley last week.

Senior quarterback Brett Grevlos said he thinks the hard week of practice this week will benefit the team on Saturday.

“We worked hard during practice this week and feel we are well prepared for Saturday,” Grevlos said.

Coach Brian Hermanson said he believes this game will be one of the biggest games of the season for the Warriors.

“This will be one of the better games in the state of South Dakota,” Hermanson said. “The team with the least mistakes will probably come out on top.”

The game Saturday will be the second big game of the weekend featuring city teams, with the first game featuring No. 1 ranked Roosevelt against the No. 4 ranked Lincoln Patriots at 7 p.m. tonight at Howard Wood.

No student activity or most other passes will be accepted Saturday. Tickets are \$7 at the gate Saturday.

The freshman A came out on top with two strong wins, 25-20 and 25-18. The freshman B also came out strong, 20-25, 25-21 and 25-23.

The conference tournament begins Sept. 12 at Rosevelt.
