WHS uses federal grant to add security cameras to hallways

A new addition to WHS this year is the placement of security cameras throughout the school, along with other high schools and middle schools in Sioux Falls.

The cameras were made possible through a grant from U.S. Homeland Security funds. Sixteen cameras have been strategically placed in many areas, including doorways, high traffic areas and the commons.

The cameras were placed in the school with the intention to keep students and staff safe and to help students feel safe at school. The cameras will be monitored by the administration at various times and recorded 24 hours a day. At any time, administrators can monitor any area of the building.

Sophomore Nick Heitkamp said he thinks the cameras are a good idea.

"I think the cameras help keep the hallways safe," Heitkamp said.

Assistant principal Lavonna Emmanuel said the cameras will be used responsibly.

"The cameras were placed in the schools for safety reasons, not to invade privacy or scare the students or faculty," Emmanuel said. "They were added to monitor the school and make sure people who do not belong are not on the premises."

Emmanuel said additional cameras in the future are also a possibility.

"The administration hopes the cameras will help them know who is in the school," Emmanuel said. "Adding additional cameras to the parking lot and other areas of the school is something the administration would like to do in the future."

Some N.O. residents return home briefly

NEW ORLEANS -- Carrying suitcases, plastic bags and heavy hearts, thousands of residents of suburban New Orleans briefly returned to their homes Monday and sifted through the sodden debris, while rescue crews sought the living and the dead.

The mayor of New Orleans shared a ghastly estimate of Hurricane Katrina's death toll—as many as 10,000 people—but he didn't cite the basis for that statement or indicate if it referred to his city or the entire region.

Many of those who briefly returned to suburban Jefferson Parish or stayed there throughout the ordeal reported a landscape dotted with bodies.

On Stella Street, Eric Breaux said he saw 15 corpses, most of them caught in barbed wire at the Metairie Country Club. "I don't want to see it again," he said. "I personally tied three dead bodies to street signs."

Authorities permitted residents of the area, a parish just west of New Orleans that includes Metairie and Kenner, to inspect their houses and recover possessions worth removing.

Many neighborhoods still were flooded but others had dried out.
