The junior varsity, sophomore and freshman football teams were all in action Tuesday as the junior varsity easily defeated the Bucks 41-0 in Yankton.

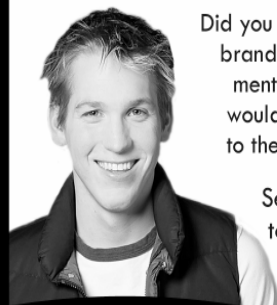
