Warrior softball team members went 2-2 in a series of softball games versus West River teams this past weekend in Rapid City.

On Friday the Warriors defeated Sturgis 4-3 in eight innings. Sophomore Alyssa Powell pitched the full game, picking up nine strikeouts while allowing only five base hits. Offensively, the Warriors were led by sophomore Stacey Schriever and senior Marcy Eggebraaten, each collecting hits.

Saturday morning the Warriors lost a tough fought 1-0 game to Rapid City Central. Sophomore Melissa Johnson pitched the complete game allowing five hits while striking out

three and allowing no earned runs.

In game two on Saturday the Warriors lost to Rapid City Stevens 2-0. In this loss, Johnson pitched a full game, allowing no earned runs and only giving up three hits while striking out 11 Stevens’ batters. She also led the offense with two hits.

In game three on Saturday the Warriors collected a 9-1 win over Douglas. In this five-inning game Johnson pitched a no-hitter, while striking out 11 of the 17 batters she faced.

The Warrior varsity record now stands at 3-5 for the year. Their next game is Thursday, versus West Central at Sherman Park. The junior varsity game begins at 6 p.m. with the varsity game following.

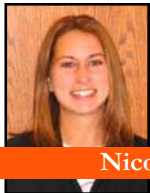
N.Korea says explosion was planned
