One of WHS's own will be inducted into the Northern State University (NSU) hall of fame this year as an outstanding athlete and coach.

Special education teacher Lenae Harrison will be inducted into the hall of fame by the Aberdeen college where she was a track standout.

Harrison said she is proud to represent her school.

"This is quite an honor that I feel fortunate to be a part

of along with my fellow college athletes at NSU," Harrison said.

After graduating from Ipswich High School in 1982 where she received top prep running honors, Harrison proceeded to NSU after being recruited on a track and field scholarship. There, she ran cross-country and track and field and also played one year of basketball. While in college she achieved All-American status, including placing fifth in the two-mile relay at the Indoor National Meet in 1984 and sixth in the distance medley relay at the indoor national meet in 1986. She would go on to place within the top 10 in various other events throughout her college career at national meets and in 1986 received the Hildred Wolfe Outstanding Athlete Award given every year to an outstanding female athlete at NSU.

Upon leaving NSU Harrison taught in Wisconsin and Massachusetts before arriving in Sioux Falls where she has been coaching and teaching for the past 12 years. Harrison has coached the WHS track and field team and the cross-country team for the past seven years and in 2001 was named the Sioux Falls Assistant Coach of the Year. When not teaching or coaching, Harrison enjoys running in her spare time including competing in two full marathons and several half marathons. She also enjoys spending time with her daughter, Jenae.

Harrison said anyone can succeed in athletics.

"Don't go through your athletic career doubting what you could have done," Harrison said. "Take every moment and opportunity to reach every goal that you set. This comes with a true commitment and an extensive amount of dedication."
