Volleyball team falls to top rated Lincoln Patriots

The Warrior varsity volleyball team fell to the Lincoln Patriots in three close games 27-29, 22-25 and 21-25 Tuesday in the gym.

Leading the Warriors was senior Shana Green with eight kills and 11 digs. Junior Sarah Hitchcock also had a total of 27 assists and two ace serves.

Junior right-hitter Alex Zawada said she thinks even though the Warriors had a disappointing loss, they still played well.

"I think that even though we lost, we did OK because they were ranked No. 1 in the pre-season game and we were able to keep up and I think we did OK," Zawada said.

WHS has a varsity record of 3-4 on the season so far and will next face the Bobcats this Thursday in Brookings.

In other action, the junior varsity and sophomore teams fared better. In JV action, the Warriors lost their first game to Lincoln Tuesday night 20-25. In the second game WHS won 25-18. In the third game, despite falling behind six-zero at the beginning of the match, the Warriors made a huge comeback and won

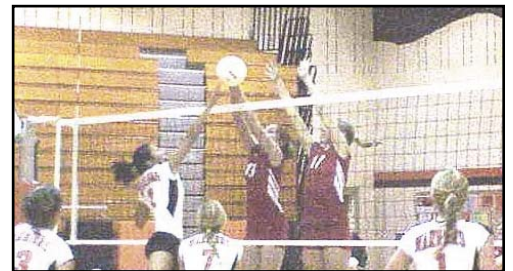

The sophomores also won easily in two games, taking the first game 25-9, and the second 25-19 after taking a 10-1 lead early in game two.

The freshman teams also played, with the A Team winning in two 25-8, 25-15 and the B Team splitting with Lincoln 11-25, 27-25.
