together and pray for our nation."

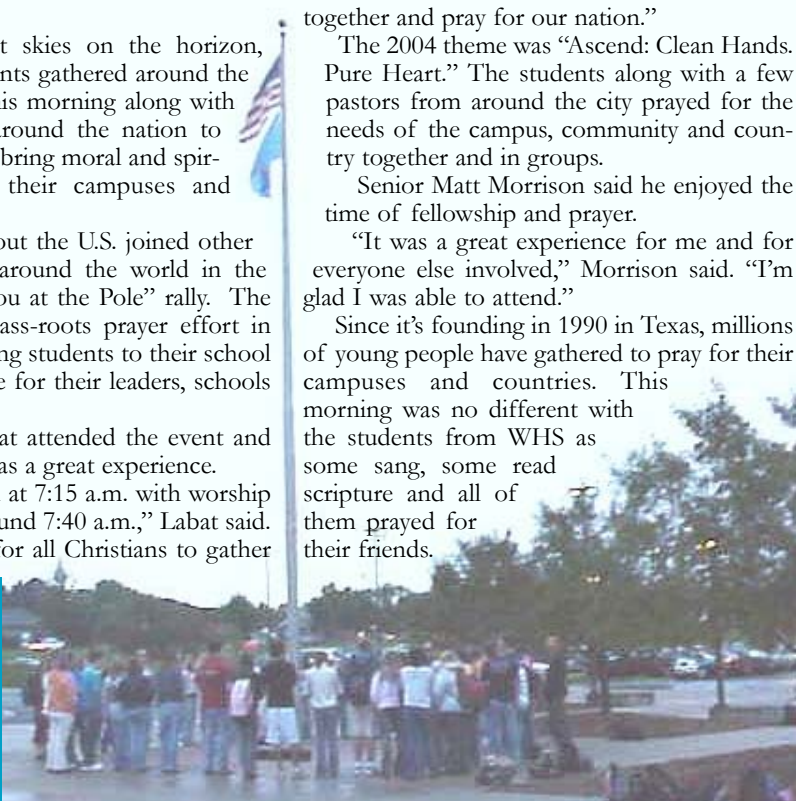

NEW ORLEANS (HSNS)—Some beach towns are deserted today and highways leading to higher ground are jammed as Hurricane Ivan roars toward the Gulf Coast with 140 mph winds.

Nearly 200 miles wide, Ivan could cause significant damage no matter where it strikes, as hurricane-force wind extended up to 105 miles out from the center.

Hurricane warnings were posted along a 300-mile stretch from Grand Isle, La., across coastal Mississippi and Alabama to Apalachicola, Fla.

"We're leaving today. All this is going under," said surfer Chuck Myers who was only taking pictures of the waves Wednesday morning at Gulf Shores. "We surfed it all day yesterday. It was glorious."
