2005 graduate Alison Bell named AP State Scholar

Advanced Placement (AP) classes can be a real challenge—a challenge WHS students are regularly taking and meeting.

For the 2004-05 school year, 2005 graduate Allison Bell was named a State Scholar as the top female AP student in the state. Only one male and one female from each state earns this honor. Bell was named a state scholar two years in a row.

But Bell was not the only one achieving AP success. Thirty-two students in 2004-05 achieved the honor of becoming an AP Scholar, meaning they earned a three or higher on at least three AP tests. The test has a range of one-five.

Nine achieved Scholar with Honor and nine the Scholar with Distinction designation. To be a Scholar with Honor they must earn an average of 3.25 on all tests taken, including three or more on at least four tests. To be a Scholar with Distinction, students must earn a 3.5 average

or better on all tests and a three or higher on at least five tests.

For the first time in eight years, three students also earned National Scholar Status, earning an average of four or higher on all exams, and a four on at least eight tests. Those students were Bell, Alex Weber and Barrett Srstka from the class of 2005.

Teacher Becky Kelly said she was very impressed with last year's scholars.

"The students showed outstanding effort, a lot of dedication and hard work," Kelly, an AP teacher and coordinator, said.

Seniors who earned honors as juniors last year include Kevin Haiar, Collin Fields, Shana Green, Tolcha Mesele and Ryan Miller as Scholars and senior Justin Egge as a Scholar with Honor.

Egge said he worked hard to achieve the honor, but is glad to have done so.

"AP classes definitely require a significant amount of work," Egge said, "but the payoff is also significant."
