# Golf team in fourth after day one

The Warrior boys golf team is sitting in fourth place at the state golf tournament after the first round of play Monday at Aberdeen's Moccasin Creek Country Club

The final round of play continues today.

WHS, shooting a first-round score of 316 strokes, is trailing seven strokes behind first-day leader Yankton with a score of 309 strokes. In second is Mitchell with a combined score of 312 strokes and in third is three-time defending state champion O'Gorman with 315 strokes.

Junior Eric Lindquist is the leader in the

competition tied with Yankton's Ty Dannenbring, both shooting a 72. Coming in second for WHS and tied for 13th overall in the individual competition is senior Brett Bennett, shooting a score of 80 strokes. Also making a contribution to the Warriors were senior Ben Rinken and junior Matt Pridey, both shooting an 82. Freshman Trevor Mathison finished with a score of 86 on day one and senior Nick Brock has a first-round score of 88.

The final round of the 2004 AA Boys Golf State Meet is today. Competition will prove to be tough with the top four favorites within seven strokes of each other.
