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**Golf team captures second at State AA Meet in Pierre**  
**Senior Lindquist earns medalist honors at event**

Warrior varsity golf team members finished second at the State AA Meet with a two-day total of 639 Tuesday at the Hills View course in Pierre.

Senior Eric Lindquist led the team and finished in first place individually, shooting a 148, beating second place Ty Dannenbring from Yankton by two strokes. Lindquist was also the only Warrior to be named to the seven-member All-Tournament Team.

Other members of the second place Warrior team included seniors Julean Michels, finishing in 12th place with a score of 160, Ryan Lehr in 27th, Matt Pridey in 30th and Brent Jamison in 45th and sophomore Trevor Mathison finishing in 54th place, overall.

Lindquist said he was happy to finish the year with a solid performance at state.

"It feels really good to come through and win at state my senior year," Lindquist said. "The hard work has paid off."

Roosevelt took first place on solid day-one scores, finishing with a score of 620. Yankton
