Both WHS soccer teams fared well in their first day of competition Thursday in the state soccer tournament in Aberdeen.

The boys defeated the fourth-ranked Lynx of Brandon Valley Thursday morning 4-3 to advance to the semifinals where they will face the top seeded Lincoln Patriots, who defeated ninth-ranked Aberdeen 5-0 Thursday.

On the girls side, the Warriors defeated the 10th ranked Brookings Bobcats 2-0 on day one.

The boys got off to a fast start in their game, scoring both goals in the first half of play then holding strong in the second half.

Leading the way for the Warriors was junior Jordan Willeson with three goals. Senior Nate Carda scored the first goal of the tournament for the Warriors.

Carda said he hopes today goes well.

"It was great to go out and play well the first day, but we have refocused and are ready to beat the Patriots," Carda said.

Scoring for WHS in the girls game was senior Amy Sandhurst and sophomore Hannah Jensen.

Sandhurst said the team came out with a lot of energy.

"We came out strong to set the pace for the game with the two goals right away, and we played great defense the rest of the way to get the shut-out," Sandhurst said. "We need to come out hard again today. We can't overlook anyone. We need to just play together and do what we did yesterday."

The girls team will next face Rapid City Central today at 4:30 p.m.
