Warriors roll on . . .

Football team downs Yankton 35-6 to advance to quarterfinals

Warrior football team members defeated the Yankton Bucks Tuesday night at Howard Wood Field 35-6.

With the win, the team will advance to the Class 11AA quarterfinals Monday.

The Warriors began with a quick start Tuesday night and ran to a 14-6 halftime score.

In the second half, the Warriors scored 21 points on three touchdowns to seal the deal.

Senior Ryan Routh, a Warrior running back and defensive back, said he felt the defense kept the team together.

“I am proud of how the guys performed,” Routh said. “Hopefully, we can bring the same intensity to the second round.”

Seniors Lee Metzger and Ryan Routh, with two and three touchdowns respectively, had all the Warrior touchdowns. Junior Trevor Cook came through on each extra-point kick to round out the scoring.

WHS nearly doubled the Bucks’ 182 total yards with 358 of their own.

Senior quarterback Layne Larson felt the game went well.

“We came out fast and got out to an early lead and put them away,” Larson said.

Coach Kim Nelson said he was pleased, especially with the defense’s performance.

“Our defense played well and big plays were key for victory,” Nelson said. “I knew the best looking team would win.”

The Warriors are next in action on Monday night in the quarterfinals at Howard Wood Field as they take on Rapid City Stevens at 8 p.m. It’s the second game of a doubleheader as Roosevelt takes on Spearfish at 5 p.m.
