SADD plans full week of Red Ribbon activities

That red ribbon on your car antenna is there for a reason—to raise awareness in you and everyone who sees it about alcohol, tobacco, drug and violence prevention efforts.

It's Red Ribbon Week at WHS and across the country, and the Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) group has come up with an exciting, fun week to celebrate, including tying the ribbons on Monday.

Red Ribbon Week began in 1985 after the kidnapping, torture and murder of Drug Enforcement Administration agent Enrique Camarena. Camarena had been working undercover in Mexico and his efforts led to the discovery of a multi-million dollar drug manufacturing operation. Drug cartels, angered by the event, kidnapped Camarena and Captain Alfredo Zavala Avelar and murdered them both. Red Ribbon Week was recognized nationally in 1988 and was brought up in order to raise awareness for drug and alcohol prevention.

Each day this week will be a different theme, starting on Monday with the students tying red ribbons onto car antennas. Today, students

will be able to donate items to the Food Pantry and donations will continue to be accepted through Thursday. Each item will be worth one point and on Friday morning the winning class will be announced and allow that class bragging rights until next year.

Wednesday, SADD members will be handing out Extreme Sour Warheads during lunch, and raffle tickets will also be sold for 50 cents each, or three tickets for \$1. Students will be able to purchase tickets until Friday when the winners are announced at the end of the day. Prizes for raffle tickets vary from Scheels gift certificates to tickets to Skyforce and Stampede games, lift passes to Great Bear and many others.

Thursday, raffle tickets will continue to be sold and it is also the last day for Food Pantry donations.

Friday is Hat Day, but before students are allowed to wear their hats, they must buy a sticker and place it visibly on the hat.

This is the first year SADD has done a full week of activities relating to Red Ribbon Week, and English teacher and SADD adviser Jeff Herbert thinks this is a good way to inform students.

"The main reason we do this is to raise awareness," Herbert said. "Our

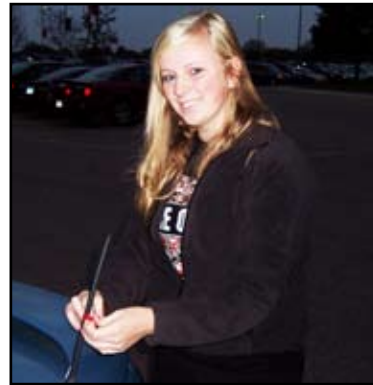

Apple's earnings surge 46 percent

SAN FRANCISCO — Apple Inc. on Monday reported a 46 percent increase in its fiscal fourth-quarter earnings as the company posted higher revenue than a year ago led by better-than-expected sales of iPhones, Mac computers and iPods.

Apple said it earned \$1.67 billion, or \$1.82 a share, on revenue of \$9.87 billion. During the same period a year ago, Apple earned \$1.14 billion, or \$1.26 a share on \$7.9 billion in sales.

Apple's results topped the estimates of analysts surveyed by Thomson Reuters, who had forecast the company to earn \$1.42 a share on revenue of \$9.2 billion.

The initial reaction to Apple's report was strong enough to send the company's shares up more than \$12, or as much as 6.5 percent, in after-hours trading to \$202.20 after earlier rising \$1.81 a share in the regular market session.

The company sold 7.4 million iPhones during the quarter ended Sept. 26. It was the first full-quarter of sales for the iPhone 3GS, Apple's latest version of its touch-screen smart phone that starts at \$199. Analysts were expecting iPhone sales of 7 million, on average.

Apple also said it sold more than 3 million Macs during the quarter, thanks in part to the back-to-school selling season. Mac shipments increased by 17 percent from the same period a year ago. Analysts had been expecting Mac sales of 2.8 million.

"It was a strong, strong quarter," said Shaw Wu, who covers Apple for Kaufman Bros. "(The) big upside was driven by Macs and iPhones. This was amazing despite very high expectations, and we're still in the middle of a recession."

The company said it sold 10.2 million iPods during the quarter, which was an 8 percent decline in shipments from the year-ago period. However, those results still exceeded the 10-million shipment figure that was expected from many Wall Street analysts.
