# Anatomy and physiology classes visit Vermillion to view cadavers

## Students tour campus, gross anatomy lab at med school

On Monday and Tuesday students in Bob Dolan's and Tim Gjoraas' anatomy and physiology classes traveled to the University of South Dakota in Vermillion to visit the medical school's gross anatomy lab and study human cadavers.

The group visited different stations in the lab and participated in hands-on activities with the human body. The two groups of nearly 60 students each both split into two groups while at the university, with each group getting the opportunity to tour the campus and visit the lab in turn.

The visited stations included a full cadaver, brains, lungs, hearts and different joints.

Senior Travis Schaefer said he enjoyed the up-close view of the body parts.

"It was a lot better than the view from the

book," Schaefer said. "The body looked similar to beef jerky up close."

In the lab, students enjoyed a talk from a fourth-year medical student, then toured the university.

"The tour was a good way to see the campus, and was worth the time," senior Peter Xayavong said. "It was fun to check everything out, the basic college experience."

The trip was meant to help students review everything that was learned throughout the year. According to Gjoraas, the hands-on experience was a great way to end the year.

"The students probably learned more in this one day than they did all year," Gjoraas said. "It gives students an opportunity to determine if they want to go into the medical field or not. The trip to Vermillion was a great experience for all and the time was well spent."

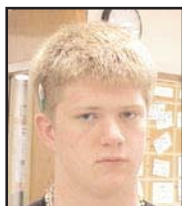

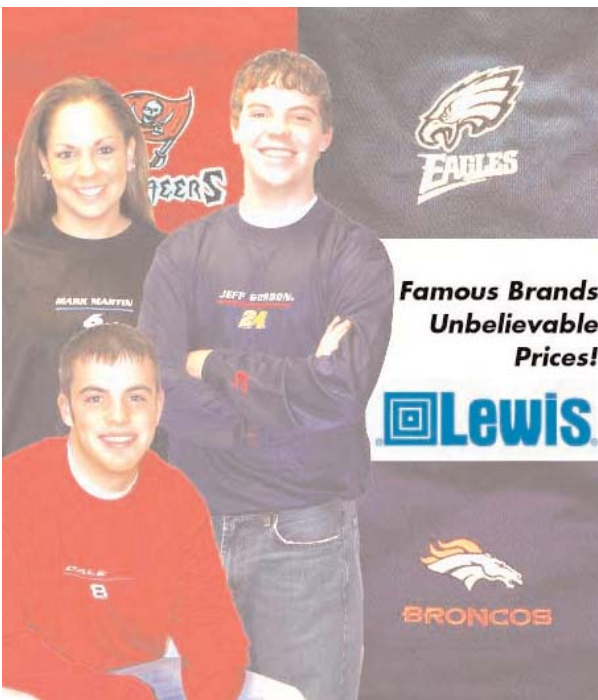
**No. 3:** The debut of the Hip Hop Stylez dance group. What up, ladies and gentlemen?
